If we conduct an online search for the greatest king ever in history, the name, Alexander

the Great comes up. History tells us that he conquered and ruled the largest empire on the

planet at that time; from Greece to northwestern India. His final day was a remarkable

one because of the great life lessons that he wanted to have on display at his funeral. His

last wishes to his Generals were noteworthy. The King of Macedonia said: "I want my

physicians to carry my coffin because people should realize that no doctor can cure

anyone. They are helpless in the face of death."

For his second wish, the king wanted his wealth to be put on display along the path to his

grave. "I spent all my life earning riches but cannot take anything with me. Let people

know that wealth is nothing but dust."

Finally, Alexander said: "My third and last wish is for both my hands to hang out of the

This was the life of a glorious and mighty king, Alexander the Great. But we have a King

who is eternal, and the ruler of the whole universe: who placed His throne in His beloved

ones' hearts.

Our King's edict to everyone is to become one in heart with Him: "Abide in me, as I

abide in you" (John 15:4). He is the mightiest King who was born in a humble manger;

born not to conquer the world but to conquer the hearts of all through loving, forgiving,

and self-sacrificing. He established His Kingdom through Love. He is a King who cried
