True Authority

Twice in this week's Gospel it says that people were astounded and amazed at Jesus because he taught and acted with authority. In this text it doesn't say what he taught that day but the people were asking if this was a new teaching – because of his authority. He was much different than the scribes who, one would assume, did not teach with the same authority. So, where does authority come from? It can't be just from belief because the scribes would have believed what they were teaching.

The dictionary says, "Authority implies the power of winning devotion or allegiance or of compelling acceptance or belief." Another word closely related to authority is 'authentic' and besides displaying a power to win devotion, Jesus was truly authentic. He transparently lived out what he taught and there was no hypocrisy in him. The original meaning of hypocrite was someone who was acting out a part like an actor on stage.

One of the most consistent parts of our human nature is hypocrisy. We hide who we are and we often act out roles that we feel are expected of us and aren't a true reflection of who we really are. Jesus had no need to be a hypocrite. His authenticity came from being deeply in relationship with the Author of all goodness and love. Jesus knew what God had written from the beginning of time and he was intimate with far more than human interpretation of the Author's laws. This made him spectacularly unique. He had no need to be an authoritarian. He left people astounded and amazed.

This is the one whom we follow and on whom we model ourselves. If we wish to influence those around us, we must become familiar with the authority of Christ and learn what it means to be authentic. That means that we search our hearts for hypocrisy, the places where we are acting a role instead of being intimately connected to the Author of our life and being. Relationship with Jesus is far more than just belief. Belief is a beginning but belief alone lacks authority and authenticity. On its own it can lead to authoritarianism.

It certainly won't cause others to be amazed and astounded!

Memorial of St. John Bosco

Wed. 31 January

Known as Don Bosco, John Melchior Bosco was born on August 16, 1815. He was an Italian Catholic priest, educator, and writer. In Turin, where the population suffered the ill effects of industrialization and urbanization, he dedicated his life to the betterment and education of street children, juvenile delinquents, and other disadvantaged youth. He formed the

Salesian Society named after St. Francis de Sales, and developed teaching methods based on love rather than punishment; a method that became known as the Salesian Preventive System. His rule was to remove temptation, treat youth with dignity and kindness, and enrich them with skills to lead them to productive lives. With the help of St. Mary Mazzarello, he also established the Salesian Sisters to do similar work among girls.

John Bosco died in 1888 and was canonized in 1934. He is the patron saint of apprentices, editors, publishers, students, young children, magicians, and juvenile delinquents.

Blessing of the Candles February 2nd

"Let us celebrate the feast (of the Presentation)
in a solemn way, illuminating
the mystery of the day with lights."
-St. Cyril of Alexandria



The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord commemorates the Blessed Mother's obedience to the Jewish law of presenting herself for purification 40 days after the birth of a male child. St. Joseph offered the redemption of the firstborn male according to the law of Moses. Together, they were in the Temple (Luke 2:22-38) at the same time as the old priest, Simeon, and prophetess, Anna as well. Upon seeing Our Lord in Mary's arms, Simeon recited the canticle that has become known as the *Nunc Dimittis*. "Now Thou dismiss Thy servant, O Lord... because my eyes have seen Thy salvation... a light of revelation to the Gentiles..."

The oldest written account of the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord was from the fourth century, by a Spanish Nun, Egeria, who kept a diary of her pilgrimage to the Holy Land. At that early date, the Feast was simply called The Fortieth Day After the Nativity. Later it was called The Encounter of Our Lord (Gr. Hypapante; O. SI. Stritenije), referring to the encounter of St. Simeon with Jesus in the Temple; the theme of the oldest homily on the Feast, ascribed to Hesychius of Jerusalem (d. after 450). The term "Presentation" was eventually adapted since Jesus was presented to God in the Temple on that day (Lk. 2, 22). Elsewhere, the Feast was called The Candles, since on that day the solemn blessing of candles was prescribed.

The Mass for the day speaks of light, and candles used in the home are blessed. The blessing of candles represents Christ, whose birth illuminates a darkened world. The custom of blessing candles on the Feast of the Presentation began in the 17th century, to fill the "needs of the people" (I Prayer of the Blessing). Recorded in The Chronicle of St. Theophanes, Emperor Justinian I issued an order in 541 A.D. on the Feast of the Presentation for a candle-light procession to implore Divine Protection against pestilence and earthquakes that plagued the city. The Church's blessing of the candles includes the bees, wax and the faithful. "This liquid comes from the labour of bees (symbol of purity) to the perfection of wax, and then goes on to bless the faithful."

St. Epiphanius (d. 403) in his letter to the monk John of Jerusalem, mentioned that passing through the country around Anablatha, he noticed a building with a "lamp burning." He later learned that the building was a "Christian Church" with a vigil-light illuminating the presence of the Lord. Today, the presence of a burning vigil-light still indicates the Real Presence of Our Lord in the Holy Eucharist in the Tabernacle, and on the Altar.

It is interesting that on the following day, February $3^{\rm rd}$, for the Feast of St. Blaise, candles are used in the blessing of throats.

Canada's Stand for the Land campaign.



Let Your Speech Always Be Gracious


CCCB Pastoral Letter on Social Media
